Secretary's Desk



Grand Lodge has sent out dues notices for 2025 of \$274

We have set up a Venmo account on our website so that you may pay your dues directly to Heartland Lodge, this will save you a fee. You may go online to the Heartland 576 website, click on the link and Pay your dues via Venmo, "Bryan Meyer-88", without paying a fee, or on iMember 2.0 and pay your dues with a credit card via Grand Lodge. There is a fee using the Grand Lodge site.

Go to Grand Lodge website (http://imember .freemason.org/ users/sign in) Click on sign in, Check membership status, Enter your E-mail Address. Or Your member ID number (which can be found on your dues card or above your name on your issue of California Freemason Magazine), which can be used to sign for the first time.. Enter a password, confirm password, complete form. Go to IMember 2.0 and log in. Use the dashboard to select the different sections/ this will put you into your personal data file. You will be able to change your information only. You will not be able change anyone else's information. There will be certain reports that you may view but not change. The new program has no provision for printing batches of dues cards. Dues cards will not mailed. You will be able to print out your dues card by accessing iMember 2.0. Also by selecting the tab for virtual dues card, this Grand Lodge app can be downloaded to a smart phone for a "virtual dues card" when visiting other lodges. This app has a 5 minute window to show the Tiler. Call us if you need assistance to log-in. Be Sure to check our website every month the calendar and updates, also special events. **The secretary's** email has changed. It is now

Music in the Quadrivium: In the classical understanding, music within the quadrivium is not about the practice of playing or composing music, but rather the study of the mathematical relationships and proportions that underpin sound and harmony. Music, as an academic discipline, encompasses the scholarly study of music itself, including its history, theory, performance, and cultural context, distinct from musical composition or performance. Key areas of study are as follows: **Musicology**: The primary academic discipline focusing on the study of music, encompassing diverse aspects like: Historical Musicology: Examines the history of music, musical traditions, and the lives and works of composers. Systematic Musicology: Explores music theory, aesthetics, musical acoustics, pedagogy, and the scientific and technological aspects of music. Ethnomusicology: Studies music within its cultural context, often involving fieldwork and ethnographic methods to understand how and why people make music. Music Theory: The academic field focused on intellectual inquiry into the systems, histories and cultural dimensions of music outside of performance. **Performance Studies:** A field that uses performance as a research method, often drawing parallels with theatre and dance to investigate musical performance. **Music Education:** Focuses on the teaching and learning of music, including pedagogy, curriculum development, and the role of music in education. **Psychology of Music:** Investigates the cognitive, emotional, and social aspects of music perception and behavior. Computational Musicology: Utilizes computer science and technology to analyze and study music. Music Therapy: A specialized area of applied musicology that uses music for therapeutic purposes, sometimes considered a health-related field.



The Forget me not



With spring time, comes flowers. For present day Masons, the flower that has the most significance is the blue"forget-me-not". The "forget-me-not," is the informal name of the Myosotis flower, generally known for being small, with 5 blue or purple petals. This flower was first used by the Grand Lodge Zur Sonne in 1926, as a Masonic emblem at the annual convention in Bremen, Germany.

In 1938, a forget-me-not badge, made by the same factory as the Masonic badge, was chosen for the Nazi Party's Winterhilfswerk, the annual charity drive of the National Socialist People's Welfare (the welfare branch of the Nazi party). This coincidence enabled Freemasons to wear the forget-me-not badge as a secret sign of membership. After World War II, the forget-me-not flower was used again as a Masonic emblem in 1948 at the first Annual Convention of the United Grand Lodges of Germany in 1948.

The badge is now worn in the coat lapel by Freemasons around the world to remember all who suffered in the name of Freemasonry, especially those during the Nazi era. Historically, it holds a place in the poetry of Wadsworth and Thoreau, medieval German legends, Christian hagiography, and English political history. For Freemasons, the forget-me-not is a symbol that reminds us of resilience and resistance, and of love for the Fraternity and its principles, even under distress and persecution. Most Freemasons, and Freemasonry as a whole, are particularly mindful of our heritage.

Both the most experienced Master Mason and the newest Entered Apprentice can appreciate the lessons and knowledge available to us through careful study. Our reverence for the wisdom of the liberal arts and sciences provides us with a unique perspective on the architectural foundations and columns of the built world, as well as a healthy respect for mathematical numbers and letters.

In addition, we see, as others do not, the internal beauty of the natural world, from the grandeur of the sun, stars, and moon, to the sacred and solemn symbolism of the most modest acacia plant. To be a Mason is to be in possession of a special gift, to always be in search of meaning, present or hidden, in the world around us.

Riding The Goat



Riding the goat is a phrase often associated with Masonic initiation ceremonies, leading to much speculation and curiosity about its origins and significance. Despite its enigmatic nature, the concept of "riding the goat" can be traced back to ancient superstitions and symbolism surrounding the mythical god Pan. Pan, who had horns, hooves, and a shaggy hide, was often referred to as "goat-footed" by the Greeks and Romans. This connection to ancient mythology ties the phrase to its perceived mystical and transformative meanings within the Masonic context.

In modern Freemasonry, the phrase is more often used metaphorically or humorously, with no literal goat-riding taking place during initiation ceremonies. While the term is frequently misconstrued as a secret ritual or an essential part of the Masonic experience, it is, in fact, simply a joke among Masons or a symbolic representation of the personal transformation that occurs during the initiation process. By understanding its historical origins and symbolic meaning, the concept of "riding the goat" can shed light on the larger context of Freemasonry and its rich, multifaceted history. The idea of "riding the goat" has been associated with Freemasonry as a mythical and humorous element. It is often thought to be a part of the initiation ceremonies, but in reality, it has little to do with the actual rituals. The origins of this concept can be traced back to antiquity when the Greeks and Romans portrayed the mystical god Pan in horns, hoof, and shaggy hide, naming him "goat-footed". There are interpretations and symbolism attached to the concept of "riding the goat" in Freemasonry: Facing challenges: This act symbolizes facing challenges head-on, even when the path seems difficult or intimidating. It encourages Masons to confront their fears and uncertainties with courage and determination. The mention of the goat in Freemasonry is mostly satirical, as found in various artworks. For example, Cassius M. Coolidge, a famous artist and Freemason included humorous references to goats and Freemasonry in his paintings.

Despite these assumptions and its vivid presence in popular culture, "riding the goat" is not an actual part of Masonic initiation ceremonies. This misconception often arises from the misunderstandings and exaggerations surrounding the secret rituals practiced in Freemasonry. The true essence of Freemasonry lies in its teachings, symbolism, and self-improvement for its members, without any literal involvement of goats or riding them.




