From the South



Brethren,

Thank you for sending me to the Leadership Retreat last month. The Grand Lodge of California is introducing a new way of looking at the management of lodges. Many of the ideas Heartland Lodge uses on an informal basis. Grand Lodge has put it down on paper and made some important changes to the duties of all of the Lodge Officers outside of the ritual duties. Many of the appointed officers have been under-utilized by lodges and many management tasks have been left to be completed by the Executive Committee. This model leaves too many out of the management of the Lodge.

This new model asks us to look at 7 major functions and assigns roles to all of the Lodge Officers. There is no reason why other Lodge Members can also assist in most areas.

The 7 Functions are: Executive, Education, Membership, Finance, Administration, Ritual, and Social. These Functions are key to keeping members engaged and getting new members. I am not going to expand on these Functions at this time; however I ask your patience as Heartland Lodge tries some new ideas.

The CMC does not allow a Lodge to use funds for the following: §809.530. PROHIBITED EXPENDITURES.

A Lodge may not: A. Expend Lodge funds for alcoholic beverages; B. Divide its monies, property or other assets with its members, even those withdrawing to form a new Lodge or with the new Lodge thus formed; C. Divide its funds with an existing Lodge by way of a contribution; D. Invest Lodge funds in its life membership fund, other than to purchase a life membership for its retiring Master; or E. Use any of its funds to subsidize, directly or indirectly, any organization, except Masonic Youth Orders or as otherwise provided in this code.

Secretary's Desk



Grand Lodge has sent out dues notices for 2025 of \$274

We have set up a Venmo account on our website so that you may pay your dues directly to Heartland Lodge, this will save you a fee. You may go online to the Heartland 576 website, click on the link and Pay your dues via Venmo, "Bryan Meyer-88", without paying a fee, or on iMember 2.0 and pay your dues with a credit card via Grand Lodge. There is a fee using the Grand Lodge site.

Go to Grand Lodge website (http://imember .freemason.org/ users/sign in) Click on sign in, Check membership status, Enter your E-mail Address. Or Your member ID number (which can be found on your dues card or above your name on your issue of California Freemason Magazine), which can be used to sign for the first time.. Enter a password, confirm password, complete form. Go to IMember 2.0 and log in. Use the dashboard to select the different sections/ this will put you into your personal data file. You will be able to change your information only. You will not be able change anyone else's information. There will be certain reports that you may view but not change. The new program has no provision for printing batches of dues cards. Dues cards will not mailed. You will be able to print out your dues card by accessing iMember 2.0. Also by selecting the tab for virtual dues card, this Grand Lodge app can be downloaded to a smart phone for a "virtual dues card" when visiting other lodges. This app has a 5 minute window to show the Tiler. Call us if you need assistance to log-in. Be Sure to check our website every month the calendar and updates, also special events. The secretary's email has changed. It is now




Friend to Friend



The <u>Friend to Friend Masonic Memorial</u> is a Gettysburg Battlefield monument depicting the "Armistead-Bingham incident" in which Union Army Captain Henry H. Bingham assisted wounded Confederate Brigadier General Lewis Addison Armistead. Both men were Freemasons. This event occurred shortly after Pickett's Charge on July 3, 1863. However, the memorial statue was not created until more than 130 years later, in 1993

July 3, 1863: Armistead was wounded at the Battle of Gettysburg. His sword was captured by Union forces and later returned in 1906. Armistead entrusted his other personal effects, including his spurs, watch chain, seal and pocketbook to Union Army Captain Bingham. This occurred while he was en route to a Union field hospital on the Spangler Farm, where he would die two days later. During his journey Armistead briefly met Capt. Bingham, and after learning that he was on the staff of General Winfield Scott Hancock, who was a Freemason as well, he asked Bingham to pass along the items with a message to Hancock. General Hancock was a "valued friend" of Armistead's from before the war, and they served together in the Federal army. Hancock was also wounded at Gettysburg and he would not see Armistead before he died.





The memorial was dedicated on August 21, 1993 and was commissioned by the Grand Lodge of Pennsylvania. The sculpture depicts Bingham at the side of Armistead and has a plaque on the reverse with information regarding the dedication: "This monument is presented by the Right Worshipful Grand Lodge of Free and Accepted Masons of Pennsylvania and dedicated as a memorial to the Freemasons of the Union and the Confederacy. Their unique bonds of friendship enabled them to remain a brotherhood undivided, even as they fought in a divided nation, faithfully supporting the respective governments under which they lived."

Masonic Education

The Beginning of Masonry in San Diego

The founding of San Diego Lodge No. 35, F. & A. M., is a somewhat celebrated event in Masonic annals of the Pacific Coast. It was the first Masonic lodge established in Southern California and preceded the first lodge in Los Angeles by a year.

Soon after J. Judson Ames arrived and began to publish the Herald, it was found that there were enough Masons in San Diego to warrant asking for a dispensation for a lodge. There is a tradition that this discovery was made at a picnic attended by most of the inhabitants in a body, as was the custom for many years. The first mention of anything Masonic was in the Herald of June 19, 1851, and read as follows:

"Masonic.—All Master Masons, in good standing with their respective lodges, are requested to assemble at the Exchange Hotel, in the City of San Diego, on Friday evening, the 20th inst., to make arrangements for celebrating the anniversary of our patron saint, John the Baptist."

The plans for this celebration seem to have fallen through, for some reason. A petition for a dispensation was drawn up, signed, sent to San Francisco, and was granted on the 1st day of August. This dispensation ran to Brothers Wm. C. Ferrell, W.M.; John Judson Ames, S.W.; John Cook, J.W.; and the following Master Masons: Daniel Barbee, Wm. Heath Davis, James W. Robinson, R. E. Raimond, and others. When the Semi-Annual Communication of the Grand Lodge assembled, on November 4, 1851, it was found that no meeting had been held and no returns received from "San Diego Lodge, U.D." and the dispensation had expired. But Brother Ames, S.W., made application on the following day to the Grand Lodge to have the dispensation extended six months, to allow more time for organization, which was granted.

Although no meeting had been held, an attempt had been made to hold one, as the following advertisement, taken from the Herald of October 9th, shows:

"There will be a meeting of San Diego Lodge, F. & A. M., at the house of Col. A. Haraszthy (Old Town) on Friday evening next, the 10th inst., at half past six o'clock. A full attendance is urged, as business of importance is to be transacted.

Oct. 9th. Per order of WORSHIPFUL MASTER."

After this, more vigor was put into the work, and the first meeting assembled on November 20, 1851, and was opened in the Master's degree. The record of this meeting begins thus:

"At a meeting of San Diego Lodge U. D. of Free and Accepted Masons held at their lodge room in the City of San Diego, on the 20th day of November, A. D. 1851 A. L. 5851, met upon the call of the W. M. "The brethren present were:

"William C. Ferrell, W. M.

John Judson Ames, S. W.

Daniel Barbee, J. W.

A. Haraszthy, Secretary.

Will. H. Moon, Tyler.

Louis Rose, Visiting Brother.

R. E. Raimond, Treasurer."

Petitions for the degrees of Masonry were received from George F. Hooper, recommended by J. Judson Ames and Wm. Heath Davis, and from Colonel John B. Magrader, of the United States Army. The first named petition was referred to a committee consisting of Brothers Haraszthy, Moon, and Ray, and the latter was ordered on file.

In this painting, civilization is traced through its architecture, from a depiction of Stonehenge on the right, through to classical buildings in the centre, and on to London on the left. In the foreground is an architect or stonemason, who is drawing plans and is surrounded by his tools: a square, compass, gavel and chisel. It's measurements are H 82 x W 122 cm Can you spot any more symbolism ?


